1. Answer any *four* of the following (*two* each from Unit—I and Unit—II) : 10×4=40

UNIT—I

- (a) Elucidate the difference between the poet and the rustic girl as to their respective concepts of death as presented in the poem, *We Are Seven*.

- (b) How does Robert Frost treat the dual theme of 'walling in' and 'walling out' in the poem, *Mending Wall* ?
- (c) How does T. S. Eliot commemorate the sacrifice of the Indian soldiers in Africa in the poem, *To the Indians Who Died in Africa*?
- (d) Do you agree with the view that Nissim Ezekiel's poem, *A Very Indian Poem in Indian English* is a satire on colloquial Indian English? Substantiate.

UNIT—II

- (a) Langston Hughes' poem, *Ballad of the Landlord* reflects the racism and discrimination that the African-Americans are subjected to in the white majority American society. Discuss.
- (b) Seamus Heaney's poem, *The Wife's Tale* presents the ignored wife's point of view in a farming family. Discuss.

(c) How does Grace Nichols deal with the problem of alienation, confusion, and uncertainty in an alien land in the poem, *Wherever I Hang* ?

(d) How does Derek Walcott treat the theme of the colonial past of West Indies in the poem, *Koenig of the River* ?

2. Explain, with reference to the context, any one of the following :

- (f) What does 'stubble' mean in the poem, *The Wife's Tale*?

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- (g) Which country does Grace Nichols originally hail from?
- (h) What does the German word 'Koenig' mean in English?

- (b) Describe in your own words the first meeting between Tschubukov and Lomov.
